"Geospatial Integration Today for Tomorrow" Planning for the 16<sup>th</sup> Annual GIS in the Rockies Conference is underway. # **Intermap Technical Tour June 13**

Our next technical tour will be Friday, June 13, 2003 at 2:00 pm at Intermap Technologies in Englewood, Colorado, near the Denver Tech Center and Centennial Airport.

Intermap's business is creating and licensing accurate digital descriptions of the surface of Earth. Intermap uses Interferometric Synthetic Aperture Radar (IFSAR) technology to produce map products for entire countries as well as smaller areas. These products provide a precise and accurate digital model of the Earth and serve a wide range of applications. Intermap has become the world's leading commercial supplier of Digital Elevation Models (DEMs), OrthoRectified Radar Images (ORRIs), and other map products derived from IFSAR technology. While Intermap's main processing facility is in Ottawa, Canada, some processing is also done in the Colorado office, which primarily houses executive, sales, marketing, and business development staff. A workstation will be set up to demonstrate the workflow that takes place in Canada.

The tour will include:

- \* a walk-through of the processing facilities
- \* a tour of the image gallery
- \* a station with interactive 3-D displays

#### National ASPRS Conferences

The Annual National ASPRS Conference is in Anchorage, Alaska this year and is quickly approaching (May 5-9, 2003). This year promises to be more focused than last year's conference in DC (which turned out to be the best-attended conference of all time since it was combined with FIG - the International Federation of Surveyors). It also appears to have a strong presence of Circum-Pacific presentations this year, drawing many international professional experts. Also, keep in mind that the **fall ASPRS conference** is going to be in **Charleston**, **SC (October 28-30**, **2003)** and for the first time ever is focused on digital terrain (elevation data) and 3-D visualization. The fall conferences, if you haven't ever attended them, are smaller in size than the Spring Annual Conferences. They are very focused, loaded with information, and always highly regarded by attendees.

And if you haven't heard, the **ASPRS National Conference in 2004** is being held in downtown **Denver** at the **Adams Mark Hotel (May 23-28, 2004)**. This location should certainly make travel costs a bit easier to manage for most of us in our four-state Rocky Mountain region and thus should be a must attend event for all of us! Planning is underway for this conference and the RMR has many responsibilities in helping National with this Conference and we could use your help. (Note: In recognition for our local region support of this National Conference, the local chapter will receive a small percentage of revenue received that will be used for awarding more scholarships to students within our own region). The RMR board has set up a sub-committee being led by **Allen Cook** to assist with all the 2004 planning. See article in this newsletter for additional information.

After careful review and methodical scoring, the ASPRS-RMR scholarship committee has identified the winners of the annual Academic Scholarship for 2002. We are pleased to announce the following winners:

**Undergraduate**: **Daisy Hebb** (Geography Major), University of Montana, Missoula, Montana

<u>Research Topic</u>: Developing land cover classification as a part of a GIS assessment that looks at the role of anthropogenic forces on the environmental ecosystem on the island of Moorea (French Polynesia).

**Graduate**: **David Micale** (Geology Major), University of Wyoming, Laramie, Wyoming

<u>Research Topic</u>: Identifying surface effects of coalbed methane development at Spotted Horse Creek, Powder River Basin, Wyoming – A site assessment using change detection analysis of satellite multispectral data in combination with field and laboratory analysis.

Each of the winners received \$750 to advance their studies at their respective Universities. They were also invited to be guests of honor at our ASPRS
