National Director's Report

ASPRS EXCOM (the Executive Committee, a subset of the Board of Directors) met February 24 in

Bethesda, Maryland, for our annual Winter Meeting. It was a typical all-day meeting, covering the annual budget, status of publications, investment performance, planning for upcoming meetings, ASPRS Foundation activities, and many, many more details. I have highlighted a few topics below for additional detail, and can provide more information to anyone, on request.

1: The ASPRS Foundation has adopted a new policy to allow Regions to invest funds in the ASPRS Foundation. This policy was developed after a suggestion by the Rocky Mountain Region last year. While there are limitations, it allows Regions to pool resources with the Foundation for (hopefully) greater investment returns, and helps us get to the point where we can fully endow our scholarship program. The Policy will be introduced at the Annual Meeting in Tampa this year, so no action will be taken by the RMR Board until after that time, when we can fully evaluate alternatives.

2: The Fall 2008 ASPRS/Pecora Conference will be in Denver, Nov. 16 – 20. **Tom Holm** of USGS-EDC is the Program Chair. ASPRS will need to identify a region representative to participate in planning meetings and coordinate Region support.

3: **Alan Voss** (TVA) made a proposal to EXCOM to produce a historical documentary on the Birth of Production Photogrammetry. It is an interesting idea that has a lot of merit, as many of the original pioneers of our discipline and technologies are disappearing. ASPRS is studying the proposal, and looking at different ways we might assist in this significant undertaking.

4: As usual, there were many, many items of discussion where ASPRS has taken a leadership role in legislative issues or provided a consistent, considered voice of reason, such as the future of the LandSat Program, floodplain mapping, and professional licensure issues in several states. ASPRS has not taken a formal position on the MAPPS/Brooks Act lawsuit to date, but the opposing positions are well understood. ASPRS believes the two sides are very polarized at this point, and central issues of the case have become blurred in the rhetoric. I think the ASPRS position will be articulated as one of reason, after the legal aspects are clear. Another interesting topic is the emerging Geospatial Line of Business being promoted by the Government Accountability Office (GAO). The implications of the GAO initiative are not yet clear, but ASPRS is watching carefully, through member contacts in several agencies.

5: Maintaining and increasing membership will be a priority issue again this year, with a special workshop for Region officers at the Annual Conference in Tampa.

Tampa will be an excellent Conference, with a lot happening. Be there if you can!

The evening began with an informal social hour, during which ideas were solicited for improving the Region in all aspects. Each person was asked to write down an idea on a sticky note, then all ideas were placed into categories on a table top for all to see and ponder. Participants were also asked to write the name of the state in which they were born on their nametags. This made for some interesting discussion, as many states across the US were represented. Later in the evening, outgoing President **Jeff Young** was able to remember the birth state of every person in attendance, long after the tags had been removed!

An impressive Italian Renaissance buffet dinner was enjoyed by all. As the meeting got underway, **Terry Ryan**, Vice President and Scholarship Committee chair, presented the two scholarship winners in attendance.

David Cook, University of Wyoming, summarized his research using remote sensing to study environmental impacts of a pipeline in Wyoming, analyzing both the growth of rural population, concentration of farm animals, and possible links to higher amounts of estrogen in the water system caused by these triggers.

Shannon Spencer, Colorado State University, gave a summary of his work studying soil carbon estimates throughout various agricultural and grazing lands within the US. Remote sensing was incorporated into a model to predict the net primary production of these lands.

Outgoing President **Jeff Young** introduced the new Board members for 2007 and they were inducted by **Tina Cary**, past National ASPRS President and ASPRS Fellow. Jeff then summarized the major activities and accomplishments of the past year. He

recognized members who had made significant contributions to the Region during 2006, including Newsletter Editor **Jennifer Whitacre**, Treasurer **Mark Hess**, and former President **Brian Soliday**.

Incoming President **Terry Ryan** then talked about his plans and hopes for 2007, especially in the area of encouraging new membership and continuing the establishment of new Student Chapters.

2006-2007 Scholarship Award Winners

The outgoing ASPRS Rocky Mountain Region Board of Directors would like to congratulate the 2007 award winners of our annual scholarship program. This past year we had a large applicant pool for our regional scholarship awards and our selection

committee was very impressed with all of the applications received. By selecting the following four winners we believe that the Rocky Mountain Region shows its ongoing commitment to academic excellence and we are glad to offer support to all students in our region.

The scholarship awards were distributed at the RMR Annual Dinner Meeting held on January 20, 2007. Recipients were as follows:

David Cook - University of Wyoming

I am currently using remote sensing to study the environmental impacts of a rural water pipeline in Sheridan, Wyoming, analyzing the growth of rural populations attributed to the pipeline's construction, and the resulting attenuation of farmland due to the establishment of rural neighborhoods, linking the concentration of farmland and subsequently farm animals to water quality and pollutant levels.

Margaret Gronemeyer - New Mexico State University

The purpose of my thesis is to determine if and how the movements of the African wild dog (*Lycaon pictus*) in northern Botswana are affected by vegetation cover. In eCognition, v.4, I classified Aster imagery using a TTA (Testing and training area) mask and 3 classes of cover (woodland, grass- floodplain, grass-dry). Now, in GIS, I am overlaying the wild dog points and other features on the classification for analyses. I expect to find that the dogs "prefer" more cover, except when hunting, but I cannot as of yet support that hypothesis 100%.

Shannon Spencer - Colorado State University

I am conducting a regional & national scale soil carbon uncertainty analysis by comparing ecosystem simulation model results to field-measured soil carbon. A statistical estimator will be developed using modeled soil carbon, land use and management information, and remotely sensed data. This estimator is expected to improve local, regional and national scale estimates of soil carbon over the current estimates, which have large uncertainty.

Jennifer Watts - Montana State University

I am using RS and object-oriented applications to assist with a study of the Golden Triangle region of Montana to determine its potential to sequester carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, using imagery and software for meeting the accuracy requirements needed to determine tillage type and its effect on the sequestration of CO₂ from the atmosphere.

ASPRS Rocky Mountain Region scholarships are offered to both undergraduate and graduate students throughout the Rocky Mountain Region of

ASPRS (Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico) who exhibit academic excellence in photogrammetry, remote sensing, and GIS. Our scholarships are offered in the fall of each year by the RMR to support academic research, as well as to aid in travel costs to encourage students to participate in ASPRS conferences throughout the year.

If you are a student who missed out on the application deadline this past year, give yourself a reminder to keep an eye out for the new scholarship application being posted in the Fall or contact Victoria Provenza for additional information. We look forward to hearing from you about your projects. Thanks again to all students who've applied to our scholarship program in the past!

Scholarship Winner's Corner

Each quarter this year we will be spotlighting one of our scholarship winners here to follow what they are doing with their scholarship monies. This quarter we received a report from **David Cook** at the University of Wyoming. Read on to find out what David is up to:

As a graduate student majoring in Geography/Water Resources at the University of Wyoming, I am working with a research team that is studying the impacts of the Wyoming Water Development Commission's rural water systems in Sheridan,

Wyoming. My personal contribution to the project not only involves a photogrammetric study, characterizing land-use changes over the past 10 years in the Sheridan Area Water Supply's (SAWS) service area, but also field-based research in a river that flows through the study area.

The burgeoning number of rural residential neighborhoods, engendered by the recent availability of municipal water, has resulted in an attenuation of land available for agriculture. It is my conjecture that the waste generated by agricultural operations becomes concentrated. This negatively impacts the water quality of the adjacent Big Goose Creek. My intent is to assimilate the land-use change study with the spatial analysis of synthetic and natural estrogens (endocrine-disrupting chemicals), showing a link between land-use change and water quality.

*This generous scholarship will be used for travel to and from the study area and in part for the costly quantification of estrogen chemicals from river water samples. I'd like to personally thank the Rocky Mountain Region of the ASPRS for their support. Lastly, I'd like to highlight the encouragement bestowed upon me by my graduate advisor, **Mike Daniels**, for the undertaking of this project.*
